President's Report

This year has proven that the hard decisions made at the CYA over the last 3 years are paying off.

With our finances under control and our cash flow at almost normal levels, we now have the operational flexibility we need to ensure we are taking advantage of opportunities and executing on our strategic plans.

Joanne Abbott, our Finance Committee Chair, and our staff have overhauled our finance systems to ensure that restricted funds are managed separately and our accounts are simpler and effective. This is reflected in our Financial statements.

Our improved financial position has enabled us to strengthen our resources in both the Training portfolio and National Team Coaching. With Tommy Wharton's promotion to Canadian Sport Center - Ontario and the increase in our coaching team by one, we have been able to recruit two highly regarded international sailing coaches to our team, Steve Mitchell (Toronto) and Erik Stibbe (Vancouver). Our coaches' roles have expanded to Coach Managers, providing a more holistic approach to supporting athlete success. We now have a coach aligned with each of our Canadian Sport Centres in Vancouver, Toronto and Halifax. We continue to support their growth and development, enhancing services to both development and elite athletes.

Kicking off at the AGM last year, our Strategic Plan has been completed and will provide a route for us to follow for several years to come. Paddy Boyd, our new executive director, has led the process to produce this plan. Paddy has, through the development of this plan, and his excellent leadership, galvanized our staff into a highly functioning team. Thank you to all our staff for their continued dedication and hard work.

Elite Sailing

Our athletes continue to perform on the world stage. Here are a few notables achievements:

- Paul Tingley winning the Gold at the open 2.4mR class championships (Netherlands, Sept 2010) with Bruce Millar following in 4th
- Two Canadians in the Laser Medal race at Skandia Sail for Gold Regatta (Weymouth Olympic Venue) Mike Leigh 3rd overall (6th in Medal Race), David Wright 6th overall (1st in Medal Race) out of 180 competitors
- Also at the Scandia Regatta:
 - RSX Men Zac Plavsic 14th
 - RSX Women Nikola Girke 13th
 - 2.4 mR Paul Tingley 4th
 - SKUD John McRoberts/ Brenda Hopkin 3rd
 - -Star Richard Clarke/Tyler Bjorn 12th
- Mike Leigh Laser 3rd overall in ISAF World Cup Standings
- Richard Clarke and Tyler Bjorn 3rd Star European Championships (June, ITA), 1st at Star Western Hemisphere Championship (April, Nassau)

We continue to support the hosting of International Regattas in Canada. RNSYS in Nova Scotia has recently won the bid to host the IFDS Worlds in 2014 and CORK is currently bidding to host the ISAF World Championships for 2014.

Domestic Development and Participation

Long Term Sailor Development Initiatives: Through CYA established work groups, our training and competition programs are undergoing a comprehensive review process.

Training: CYA's operational committee for objectives in Training and Certification was reinstated this year when the chair stepped down and the terms of reference finalized. See the CYA Training and Certification Committee Report in this AGM pack for a look at the past, current and planned activities of the TCC, its sub-committees and work groups.

Competitions: CYA appointed event coaches at each of our Regional events and at CYA Youth National Championships. Sailors and Coaches alike at the events took in the expertise and experienced mentorship, respectively. The following host venue organizations are to be commended on delivering successful events this year:

- Wabamun Sailing Club, Alberta, CYA Sail West, Chair Frank Kortbeek
- Northern Yacht Club, Nova Scotia, CYA Sail East, Co-Chairs Dean Baldwin and Denis Astephen
- Nepean Sailing Club, Ontario, CYA Youth National Sailing Championships, Co-Chairs David Searle and Dave Bradley
- Royal Vancouver Yacht Club, BC, Mobility Cup
- CORK, Ontario, Laser and Radial National Qualifier Regatta at Fall CORK, Chair Tim Irwin

Sport Participation and Development: With the support and assistance of Sport Canada, CYA encouraged entry level recruitment of persons into sailing – youth, persons with disabilities, and Canada's First Nations Communities. Sailors in 8 of our Provinces were supported by one or more of the following means:

- <u>Coaching support</u> CYA appointed coaching to introduce and develop sailors, and mentor coaches and support personnel in the Paralympic Classes at Mobility Cup, the 2.4mR Introduction and Development Camp and Racing Fleet at Royal Victoria Yacht Club's Fall Dinghy Championships in BC, and the 2.4mR Awareness and Introduction Clinic in Nova Scotia.
- <u>Sailor Travel</u> Sailors from Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec travelled to Mobility Cup in BC; Sailors from Alberta and Manitoba travelled to the 2.4mR Introduction and Development Camp and Fleet Race at Fall dinghy Championships in Victoria, BC; One sailor from PEI travelled to Halifax for the 2.4mR Awareness and Introduction Camp
- <u>Program delivery / Coaching</u> COSA BC's Able Sail and Entry Program; Ontario's BOOM and Access BOOM; Nova Scotia's Mobile Program for able bodied and disabled Youth; and BC's First Nations Program

CANSail Profile: The national sailing database has been upgraded to include Sailors as well as the Instructors, Coaches, Officials, Clubs and Class Associations that it always has held. The CYA profile number is now called the CANSail#. This upgrade opens the door for CYA, the PSAs and Sport Centres to plan effective communications and track sailor activity. All sailors at CYA events and in CYA supported programs this year now hold a CANSail profile.

PCOC

CYA continues to provide the Pleasure Craft Operator's Card through a network of CYA accredited Course Providers. As the date for mandatory requirement to carry a PCOC has passed, the greatest amount of CYA activity is based on issuing replacement cards. Consequently, income from the PCOC sector will tail off.

Partnerships

We have been working more closely with our provincial partners on a number of fronts through staff and volunteer collaboration. This work is helping to operationalize our strategic plan and review our programs in the light of our Plan and the Long Term Sailor Development framework.

We have been working closely with US Sailing, RYA, and the Canadian Power and Sail Squadron. As a result we have a stronger lobby at Transport Canada, and are enhancing our cruising standards with the Yachtmaster scheme.

In support of our elite athletes we have formed a very strong partnership with Wind Athletes. On the commercial side we are partnering with Canadian Yachting, Gill, Harken and Salus.

Working Together for the Future of Sailing

Both Paddy and I had the opportunity to meet and dialogue with many of our member clubs, schools and classes and their members over the last year. CYA is working harder to offer you valuable programs and services and to communicate that value more clearly.

Together we can ensure the success of sailing as a sport (in the broadest sense) and can leverage the value that working together within our association can bring for Canada, our local organizations, our athletes, and the members of our member organizations.

Provincial Sailing Association Reports	6.0



Another great sailing and cruising season is almost over in BC. This year, our highlights included Mobility Cup, a successful BC Summer Games and growth among the first nations participants. BC Sailing has presently 41 club and 38 schools as members.

The Mobility Cup took place with incredible conditions at the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club in September. 60 racers from across the country with many more volunteers were exposed to excellent coaching and race committee throughout the weeks activities.

The BC Summer Games had 65 sailors from ages 10 to 19 and 16 coaches as well as 2 experts who engaged the sailors and the volunteers in training on and off the water. This included training for new judges and race committees. A big thank you to Rocky Point Sailing Association for hosting this event.

The BC Sailing's Championship was again hosted by Kamloops SC and as a tradition, sailors loved it with the many activities they were engaged in in addition to the sailing. A total of 55 single handed sailors raced, with the majority of the sailors sailing the Optimist dinghy.

The BC Helly Hansen Sailing circuit has had 8 events so far this year with the last one to come at the end of October. A total of 280 sailors have taken part in one event or more.

Our first nations program offered at some clubs has been very successful and will be continued in 2011. In addition, a new racing program has started at Cultus Lake in the Optimist Dinghy, following the successes from Comox.

Our Optimist Mobile program was again fully subscribed and we sold all 8 boats to local clubs who are starting their own programs so we replaced the boats with new Optimists. BC Sailing also supported the 10 BC Sailors who attended the Optimist North Americans in Kingston with new boats. BC Sailing also supported Sail West and is looking forward to hosting Sail West in 2012.

New initiatives for 2010 included the boat safety course and BC Sailing is presently working on updating the Wet Feet, Optimist 1, 2 programs and continuing on with an Optimist 3 and 4 program which will also be pulled into a single handed program started in the Laser 4.7 or Laser Radials.

On the Learn to front, BC Sailing distributed the following seals:

Learn to Cruise – 650 LTS certificate – 1666 WS I seals – 572 WS II seals – 458 WS III seals – 294 Bronze IV seals – 228 Bronze V seals – 142 Silver VI seals – 86 LTR seals – 150 Pram seal – 107 Participation seals – 154 Total LTS seals for 2010 is 2191

The BC Sailing executive and board have been realigned, with the executive forming the portfolio section and the board as the regional representation. This will help in creating new ideas and growth within our organization. Most important will be the development of a new communications structure at three levels to ensure that the message from CYA and BC Sailing is disseminated all the way to the member level. John Abel was elected as the new president in September. Many thanks to Ruth Grierson for her 8 years as President and we are fortunate that she will be continuing on the executive along with a number of new faces.



Our principle objective for 2010 was to develop programs and participation in the Fundamental and Learn to Sail Fast segments of the Long Term Sailor Development Model. These critical stages of 6 to 8/9 years old and 8/9 to 12/13 years are where kids can easily acquire skills that will stay with them for life. Alberta Sailing organized, subsidized and ran programs in three clubs and supported young youth development teams in two others. In 2010 existing club member children benefited almost exclusively from program development. The challenge for 2011 is to expand the programs by attracting kids from outside of the clubs and possibly adding more clubs with programs.

The outcome was 10 new to sailing kids in Optis at Sail West and 9 Optis at the Provincial Championships. Also at the Provincial Championships were 4 Bytes, 5 Fireballs, 8 Radials, 9 Open and 21 Lasers.

ASA is investigating opportunities for a Mobile Optimist Sailing School as a seed to start local programs. Interest is coming from Cold Lake, Sylvan Lake, Central Alberta Sailing Club and Lac La Biche. The ability to build sustainable programs will have to be an important part of our decision making.

We estimated that over 1500 Alberta kids who are not members of sailing clubs get Fundamental sailing training every year. Less than 1% of the experiences will result in the young sailor joining a club and moving to the Learn to Sail Fast stage of development in the LTSD. We think there is room and opportunity for improvement.

ASA supported the usual off season training camps in Victoria and several club training camps during the summer including Sail West at Wabamun Sailing Club. We supported athletes attending Youth Nationals in Ottawa, US Nationals in Milwaukee, Sail West and Western Intermediates at Wabamun Lake, Opti Nationals in Hamilton, Pumpkin Bowl in Vancouver and the Student Yachting World Cup in France. Small numbers of travelling athletes made it more economical to support financially and partner with other teams than it was to send our own coaches.

For several years Alberta sailors have placed consistently well at the Mobility Cup. To move the level of competition up ASA is buying two 2.4 Meter (The single handed adaptive sailing boat at the Olympics and the 2013 Canada games) training boats. We hope to build on the training partnerships with athletes and coaches that were established at the training camp and Fall Dinghies in Victoria.

Many thanks to the 14 clubs and 8 school promoting sailing in Alberta. Also, thanks to ASA coaches Hannah, Heather and club coaches Zoe, Kristie and Kelsey for an amazing job moving entry level sailing forward in Alberta.

The Saskatchewan Sailing Clubs Association (SSCA) has 8 member clubs. Five of these are dinghy clubs, plus 1 kite/windsurfing club, 1 keelboat club, and 1 disabled sailing club. The club sites are rustic compared to most venues in larger Canadian centres, only 2 having electric power for example. However, this is balanced by good winds and clean waters with relatively little boat traffic.

Provincial Championship trophies were awarded this year to Men's Laser, Women's Laser, Master's Laser, Disabled Sailing, Windsurfing, and Youth. There were 10 or fewer competitors racing for each category.

SSCA operates a single Mobile Sailing School that serves all member clubs plus a number of other organizations. This year the School awarded 49 White Sail I and 9 White Sail II certificates. In addition, the MSS together with the Provincial Coach provided a sailing program for one of the Saskatoon school boards' Outdoor Education Program from June 1 to 23. This gave 325 students a half-day exposure to sailing during which each student helmed and crewed a 420.

In the past, SSCA has waited until hosting CYA-named regattas provided the impetus for the certification of race officials. In 2009 and 2010, however, with the assistance of Lorne Chapman (BC) and Robert Stewart (ON, late of AB), several new Club Judges have been certified. The SSCA and Alberta Sailing Association (Peter Van Muyden) are also cooperating in the development of Race Officers in Saskatchewan. SSCA would like to thank these officials and their organizations for their efforts, as well as Leo Reise and Paul Ulibarri for their advice.

Budget issues and participation numbers are the biggest challenges facing SSCA in the near future. For example, SSCA does not currently own a race-worthy 420 nor a 2.4 Metre boat for the next Canada Games. In addition, the Lasers in their various configurations are showing their ages. SSCA's biggest challenge is the decrease in regatta attendance over the last several years. Solutions are being sought to reverse this trend but no courses of action have been identified.

It was another busy year for the sailors, coaches and volunteers in 2010. Our cruising program in the spring saw growing numbers and 56 people received their basic cruising and 8 received coastal navigation certification. We also ran three VHF courses and one GPS course.

In addition to building on the programs and activities of the past years, Sail Manitoba started a new 2.4m program and a new windsurfing program. With the assistance of Sport Manitoba grants we purchased a 2.4m boat and 3 introductory boardsailing rigs. Our staff worked hard throughout the year to build enthusiasm and participation in these programs.

Activity at the 21 yacht clubs around the province seems to be growing as well. Many yacht clubs are experiencing membership growth as sailing and windsurfing are gaining in popularity. Our LTS program at the Winnipeg Sailing Centre started slow but picked up during the summer. In addition our mobile sailing program was busy throughout the summer; the program was enhanced with the addition of the windsurfing program as well as 2 double-handed boats for an adult LTS program In total 182 sailors were certified in White Sail programs.

The Provincial team, under the guidance of coaches Brigitte Smutny, Rory McMorris and Tanja Smutny, had an extremely early start of the season with an equipment day on April 25th, apparently the earliest ever in Manitoba's history. After a very busy summer traveling to major regattas, they are still on the water with the final equipment day planned for October 23rd.

As well, several intense racing clinics were offered at yacht clubs around the province. The Provincial Championship circuit (best 5 out of 6 regattas) was attended by 65 sailors in different regattas. Beside Lasers, Radials, 4.7s, Optis and 29ers, 5 Laser master sailors competed for the first time in the circuit. The truck with the big trailer will be leaving in the last week of October with 9 Lasers, Radials and 4.7s, one 29er, one 2.4m, one windsurfer and a coachboat to be stored over the winter out West. Manitoba's athletes will tag on programs run in Vancouver and Victoria and attend Midwinter events at the West coast.

Overall, 2010 has been a great year for sailing in Manitoba and we are very excited about the growth opportunities for our sport. On behalf of the Board I would like to thank the multitude of sailing enthusiasts who volunteer with their yacht clubs and who help make sailing in Manitoba an enjoyable and positive experience for everyone.

An excellent summer for the BOOM Mobile Sailing School Program

- In 2010, the BOOM program operated four mobiles, including the Access team which teaches people with disabilities how to sail.
- The BOOM program brings boats and instructors to communities and small yacht/ sailing clubs across Ontario that do not have their own sailing schools to teach youth and adults how to sail.
- A total of 26 sites across Ontario were visited, 30,000 kms. were travelled and 600 students were taught how to sail.

Ontario Sailing hired a full-time Provincial coach/manger, Murray McCullough.

Murray a former member of the National and Provincial Sailing teams is a level 3 coach and is presently working on his level 4 at the National Coaching Institute in Toronto. He is a graduate of the University of Western Ontario in Kinesiology.

Another season has passed and it was certainly a very busy but challenging one for NBSA. NBSA did not have a Coach this summer for the Junior sailors. The competitive sailors went to regattas with the Head Instructors of their sailing schools. NBSA is looking at hiring a fulltime summer coach for the season 2011.

The four sailing schools were very well attended. Each of the four sailing schools had adult lessons as well as Able Sail in Shediac with record numbers. Number of seals sold to the four schools were: 300 WS1 – 200 WS11 – 100-WS111 and for the Bronze IV -85- BSV – 50 and 10-silver.

Our Provincial Team is chosen based on points accumulated from the three circuit races in our province. Approximately 100 sailors attended these regattas. The classes of boats at these regattas are the Opti-Byte – C11- Laser Radial – Laser – 29er – and 420.

NBSA has seven member clubs. Some reported larger memberships and a few reported smaller membership. It is still a challenge getting the clubs to report all their membership. Initiatives undertaken as supported by our Provincial Sport office might help this situation as on November 6 our Sport Consultant is facilitating a Strategic Planning Session. They are covering all expenses that will be incurred by staging this session. Membership is definitely one of the issues to be addressed at this planning session as well as adapting the Long Term Athlete Development Plan to our association's plans. NBSA is blending NBSA's plan with the new CYA Strategic Plan. Hope that we are successful in mapping out a workable plan for the Sailing Association.

In 2010 NBSA had an Instructor's clinic in May. The Fundamental clinic was held one weekend prior to the White and Bronze Sail clinic. NBSA and the other Atlantic provinces open their clinics to all instructors. Twenty from NB were successful in receiving their certification.

In closing, I am looking forward to working with everyone again to make our association more visible to the boating public. The CYA should be supported for all their hard work in staging such an event as the CYA AGM.

It's rare to see my nine year old son cry with emotion, but he had tears on the last day, as he was not looking forward to the camp coming to an end!

Many thanks to Ontario, BC, and Manitoba who provided excellent recommendations when NSYA was setting up the program.

Provincial Championships

The NSYA awarded provincial championships in the following classes; Opti, 420, Laser Radial, Laser, and Women's Keelboat. All events were a great success and attracted more than 100 sailors. Age group championships were crowned in 16 & Under, and 18& Under categories.

In 2011 the NSYA will likely make a Provincial Championship series with winner declared at the final event in October.

- 7 The RNSYS has also contracted a Cruising Instructor to run programs at the Club and to date it has been very successful.

Audit Committee Report

From: Audit Committee Date: September 2010

The audit committee is appointed by the board of directors of the Canadian Yachting Association to fulfill an oversight role in ensuring the quality and integrity of the financial statements of the organization. Our responsibilities include but are not limited to:

- Reviewing and discussing reports of the external auditors on critical accounting policies, including management's responses;
- Review annually the accounting policies and make recommendations to the Board;
- Monitor and review the standards of risk management and internal control.

The Audit Committee 2009 comprises independent non-directors of the Canadian Yachting Association including David Everett, Julian Hatherell, and Carole Presseault. For 2010 Joanne Abbott excused herself as an active member of the audit committee due to her role internally with the CYA.

The audit committee met on July 21, 2010. In addition to the members above, CYA Executive Director Paddy Boyd and Tyler Rider representing the CYA's External Auditors, Secker, Ross & Perry, Chartered Accountants attended the meeting. Joanne Abbott was asked by the audit committee chair to attend the audit meeting as a non-voting participant. Her attendance was requested based on her knowledge and experience within the CYA and most importantly her judgement and integrity with all matters relating to the CYA.

The committee members were provided with draft audited financial statements for the year ended March 31, 2010. Budget figures for 2010 - 2011 were requested and provided to the committee.

FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS:

a) General Fund

The General Fund of the CYA produced net revenues over expenses of \$187,033 in 2010 comparative to a restated surplus of 75,907 for 2009. The surplus for fiscal year end March 31, 2010 marks the second surplus in as many years. The committee was clear in its acknowledgement of the improved financial performance of the CYA for 2010.

Some minor issues involving inventory vs cost of goods sold were reviewed by the auditors resulting in adjustments to the operating performance for 2009. These adjustments were considered by the audit committee and agreed to be appropriate.

b) Budgeting

The Audit Committee has been provided with the revised budget for the fiscal year 2010 - 2011. The budget indicates that the board anticipates general operating revenues will exceed expenses by approximately \$96,372. The audit committee is pleased that a surplus budget as a realistic and achievable target is being continued as part of the CYA's annual financial planning.

f) Risk Management

There were two areas involving potential risk to the organisation that were covered in the audit meeting:

 Investment Policy;
 The audit committee is of the opinion that a written CYA investment policy is required to provide management with appropriate guidance and the board with appropriate oversight. The CYA is currently investing approximately \$1,233,000. The audit committee will make itself available to review a new (draft) policy and to make recommendations based on their assessment.

2) Insurance Review;

The audit committee has asked that the insurance contracts protecting the CYA be reviewed on an annual basis to ensure that the organisation is adequately protected. The audit committee received confirmation from management that insurance reviews were being conducted on an annual basis.

SUMMARY

The board and staff are again commended for their transparency in the presentation of the financial statements and board policies therein and their determination in maintaining the organization on a "positive" cash flow basis. We would like to thank Paddy Boyd and his staff for their efforts this past year.

CONCLUSIONS

The audit committee presents to the Board and Members of the CYA the following recommendations.

- 1) The audit committee has reviewed and recommends approval of the 2009 2010 audited financial statements.
- 2) The audit committee recommends the reappointment of the auditors Secker, Ross & Perry, Chartered Accountants for the financial year 2010 2011

AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Members of Canadian Yachting Association

We have audited the statement of financial position of Canadian Yachting Association as at March 31, 2010 and the statements of operations, changes in fund balances and cash flow for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the association's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as explained in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform an audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation.

In common with many not-for-profit organizations, the association derives revenue from donations, memberships and fund raising activities the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of this revenue was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the association and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenue and fund balances.

In our opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which we might have determined to be necessary had we been able to satisfy ourselves concerning the completeness of the revenue referred to in the preceding paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the association as at March 31, 2010 and the results of its operations and cash flow for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED MARCH 31, 2010

1. Purpose of the Association

The Canadian Yachting Association is a Registered Amateur Athletic Association with charitable status, designated by the Government of Canada as a National Sport Organization representing the sport of sailing. The association represents all participants including recreational sailors and high performance athletes at the club, provincial, national and international level. The association is exempt from income tax under subsection 149(1)(1) of the Canadian Income Tax Act.

2. Significant Accounting Policies

(a) The Canadian Yachting Association follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions.

The General Fund accounts for the organization's program delivery and administrative activities.

The Financial Assistance Program Fund reports mainly revenues and expenses of the Canadian Sailing Team and its development as well as club development projects including junior sailing initiatives. Revenue is received in the form of donations and expenses are paid out in the form of reimbursement of training and racing expenses of sailors.

The Olympic Fund is made up of resources originally from the 1988 Olympic Games legacy and subsequent contributions from Canadian Yachting Association operations and interest on investments.

The Endowment Funds were established by the donors to be used for the following specific purposes:

(i) R. C. Stevenson Boat Loan Fund

The R. C. Stevenson Boat Loan Fund was established in 1982 to provide loans to member clubs for the purchase of junior training boats. The loans are repayable over a two year period and are subject to a 4% annual administration fee.

(ii) Marvin McDill Endowment Fund

The Marvin McDill Endowment Fund was established in memory of M. V. McDill. The income from the fund is given to worthy Canadian sailors who compete internationally to help with travel and/or boat expenses.

(iii) Bill Burk Youth Fund

The Bill Burk Youth Fund was established in 1997 in memory of W. Burk. The purpose of the fund is to provide top Canadian youth sailors with a unique training opportunity that will accelerate their development and motivation to pursue the sport at an international level.

(iv) Nathan Cowan Memorial Fund

The Nathan Cowan Memorial Fund was established in 2002 in memory of N. Cowan. The Nathan R. Cowan Memorial Award for Developing Sailors is awarded to a young sailor (19 and over as of December 31* in the year of nomination) with a record of outstanding achievement in national and international competition. The sailor must have followed a committed training program, demonstrated an effort in fund raising through sponsorship and private contributions and brought recognition to Canadian competitive sailing.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued)

2. Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(b) Investments

Short-term investments are comprised of both held to maturity assets and available for sale assets. Held to maturity assets are recorded at amortized cost. Available for sale assets are recorded at fair market value.

(c) inventory

Inventory consists of books, clothing, PCOC cards and materials and association insignia held for resale. Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value with cost determined on a first-in first-out basis.

(d) Capital Assets

Capital assets consist of office furniture and equipment and leasehold improvements owned by the association. Furniture and equipment are capitalized in the year of purchase and amortized over a five year period on a straight-line basis. Leasehold improvements are capitalized in the year of purchase and amortized over a ten year period on a straight-line basis.

(e) Revenue Recognition

Restricted contributions related to general operations are recognized as revenue of the General Fund in the year which the related expenses are incurred. All other restricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the appropriated restricted fund.

Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue of the General Fund in the year received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Contributions for endowments are recognized as revenue of the Endowment Funds.

Investment income carned on the Olympic Fund and on Endowment Funds is recognized as revenue of the respective fund. All other investment income is recognized as revenue in the General Fund.

(f) Donated Services

The work of the association is dependent on the voluntary service of the members of the association. Since these services are not normally purchased by the association and because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, donated services are not recognized in these financial statements.

(g) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expense during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

(h) Foreign Currency Translation

Foreign currency accounts are translated into Canadian dollars as follows:

- At the transaction date, each asset, liability and expense is translated into Canadian dollars by the use of the exchange rate in effect at that date;
- (ii) at the period end date, monetary assets and liabilities are translated into Canadian dollars by using the exchange rate in effect at that date. The resulting foreign exchange gains and losses are included in income in the current period.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued)

2. Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

(i) Financial Instruments

The association's financial instruments consist of cash, short-term investments, accounts receivable, loans receivable and accounts payable and accrued liabilities. All financial instruments are initially recorded at fair market value.

Held to maturity short-term investments are subsequently accounted for at amortized cost using the effective interest rate. Cost plus accrued interest approximates fair market value. Available for sale short-term investments are subsequently accounted for at fair market value. Any unrealized gains and losses are recorded through the cumulative gain (loss) account in the fund balance.

Loans receivable charge an administration fee that is considered to be an equivalent market rate of interest.

The carrying amounts for cash, accounts receivable and accounts payable and accrued liabilities approximate their fair market values because of the short-term nature of these instruments.

When there is a decline in value of a financial asset that is other than a temporary decline, the asset is written down and the loss is recognized in income. The write-down is not reversed if there is a subsequent increase in value.

It is management's opinion that the association is not exposed to significant interest, currency, or credit risks arising from its financial instruments.

3. Cash and Bank

The association's bank accounts are held at one chartered bank. The bank accounts earn interest from 0% to ½%. Bank balances include \$1,773 denominated in U.S. dollars translated to Canadian dollars at March 31, 2010.

12. Interfund Transfers and Loans

In accordance with the terms of the internally restricted funds and the appropriate Board resolutions, \$161,000 loaned from the Olympic Fund to the General Fund to assist the General Fund with regular operations was repaid during the year. Simple interest of 0.25% per month was charged by the Olympic Fund to the General Fund related to the loan. There were no fixed terms of repayment. The General Fund is able to borrow up to a maximum of \$300,000 from the Olympic Fund.

In 2009 \$50,000 was transferred from the Olympic Fund to the General Fund to assist with the Canadian Sailing Team operations.

13. Section 4470 - Disclosure of Allocated Expenses by Not-for-Profit Organizations

Effective April 1, 2009, Canadian Yachting Association adopted retrospectively CICA Handbook Section 4470, Disclosure of Allocated Expenses by Not-for-Profit Organizations, which requires an organization to disclose its allocation policy if it classifies expenses by function and allocates some of its general support costs to another function. The adoption of this standard had no impact on the financial statements of Canadian Yachting Association.

14. Comparative Figures

Certain 2009 comparative figures have been reclassified to conform with the financial statement presentation adopted in the current year.

Appendix 1

Training and Certification Committee Report

This annual report of the CYA Training and Certification Committee (TCC) describes activities and results since the 2009 CYA Annual General Meeting. The 2010 year has been one of considerable change for CYA's Training and Certification initiatives, as a result of the CYA's renewed strategic objectives.

This report first examines the TCC's mandate before describing the Committee's structure and membership. The report then outlines activities in its four broad areas of responsibility before examining overall achievements in the context of the CYA Strategic Plan.

Mandate:

The CYA Training and Certification Committee (TCC) is responsible for creating, updating and maintaining CYA standards for sailors, officials, coaches and instructors and for the delivery of associated programs through subordinate bodies. The TCC is accountable to the CYA Executive Director.1

Structure/Membership during the Year

Through 2009, the TCC operated with four subordinate sub-committees addressing Judges, Race Management, Learn-to-Sail/Race (LTS/R), and Learn-to-Cruise/Power (LTC/P).2 In the third quarter of 2009, the Chair of TCC resigned due to pressure of academic work, and there was a period of inactivity during the search for, and appointment of a new Chair.

After appointment of the new chair, discussions involving the Chair, the CYA Executive Director and CYA staff identified a need for some restructuring of TCC activities. In particular, proposed new approaches to coaching development and to the delivery of advanced cruising training led to the dissolution of the Learn-to-Sail/Race and Learn-to-Cruise/Power Sub-committees. Following this, the membership of the TCC itself was re-examined and new appointments were made to strengthen LTS/R and LTC/P representation.3

We would like to acknowledge the contributions of Kim Foley, past Chair of the TCC, and of Lennie Liscio and Kim Moffat, the past Chairs of the LTS/R and LTC/P sub-committees respectively.

Judges

At the close of 2009, the TCC approved a new CYA Judging Program that more-closely aligned CYA standards and practices with those of key English-speaking Member National Authorities of ISAF (Australia, New Zealand, the United Kingdom, and USA). The new CYA standard reduced the number of judge levels from four to three (Club, Regional, and National Judge) and introduced standardized testing as a component of the certification process. Standardized judge seminar materials were developed by the sub-committee in support of the new judging standard.

During the course of the year, members of the Judges Sub-Committee delivered 64 seminars at which tests were administered to candidates for Club Judge certification. A prototype Regional/National seminar was delivered at CORK, albeit without a test being administered. Overall, 24 of the 27 candidates who wrote tests received a passing grade.

During the course of the year, the Judges Sub-committee processed eight applications for certification or recertification of judges under the new Judging Program. Additionally, the Sub-committee examined one application for International Judge and recommended that the CYA Board recommend its consideration by ISAF. Finally, the Judges Sub-committee approved the establishment of an Atlantic Judge Certification Committee to process applications for Club Judge within Atlantic Canada. Ontario, Alberta and British Columbia already have Judge Certification Committees with delegated authority from the CYA Judges Sub-committee.

The Judges Sub-committee is now beginning an evaluation of the new program, and especially training and testing practices, to determine what lessons might be learned from the first year of operation.

Race Management

Early in 2009 the Race Management Sub-committee (RMSC) revised the curriculum for its National Race Management Seminar by including more situational analysis, collaborative work and role-playing. The revised seminar was presented at the Port Credit Yacht Club (ON) in March, where approximately 80 percent of the 18 candidates passed the exam.

During the year the RMSC certified or re-certified two Race Management Course Conductors, four Senior National Race Officers, and two National Race Officers. Certification of lower level CYA Race Officers is delegated to the Provincial Sailing Associations. The RMSC examined two applications for International Race Officer during the year; one was withdrawn by the applicant and the other was not supported by the RMSC for recommendation to ISAF.

The next race management seminar is planned for March 2011, at the Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club in Quebec. Its delivery will be available in both official languages, through the use of a translator and provision of both French and English-language tests.

Learn-to-Sail/Race (Coaching)

Prior to its dissolution, the LTS/R Sub-committee held three working meetings during the year. The Sub-committee's activities included updating the LTS/R policy manual, development of a pilot fundamental course, and planning of a National LTS/R Learning Facilitator/Evaluator Clinic.

The Learn-to-Sail/Race community is undergoing considerable change. Operationally, certification of coaches has been delegated to the Provincial Sailing Associations by the CYA. At the same time, both the sailing curriculum and the career development pathways for coaches are being revised, both to reflect best practice and to support the CYA's strategic direction. Most of this work is being done by delegated technical work groups or task forces outside of the TCC, although ultimately, TCC approval will be required for final versions.

Rescue operations represent an important skill set for coaches, but to date, CYA coaches have relied on the Lifesaving Society's Boat Rescue Course as evidence of competence. Both BC Sailing and FVQ have developed expanded LSS curricula more suited to sailing than swimming, and the TCC is examining how these or other Boat Safety Courses might be adopted for the award of a Boat Safety certification by the CYA, rather than relying upon the Lifesaving Society. Such certification would also be beneficial for other clients, such as on-water regatta safety personnel.

Learn-to-Cruise (Sail/Power)

As part of its 'best practices' initiative, the CYA has negotiated with the Royal Yachting Association for licensed use of the RYA Yachtmaster program. Adoption of the RYA program would offer high-level course-based curricula hitherto unavailable from CYA. The RYA Yachtmaster programming also offers the advantage of some international recognition that simplifies chartering and supports paid activities, either for yacht delivery or large yacht operations.

The TCC has begun a comparative analysis of CYA and RYA programs to establish how RYA programs might best be adopted to supplement existing CYA programs. Care is required in adopting a strategy that does not threaten existing commercial operations that are the mainstay of the delivery of CYA Learn-to-Cruise programs.

Progress against CYA Strategic Goals

The TCC's activities mainly address the 'Sailing for Life' component of the CYA Strategic Plan, and especially increases in the number and quality of officials, instructors and coaches, and increases in the

number and quality of CYA programs being delivered by clubs and by stakeholders. This section will address the TCC's activity areas in turn: first it will examine officials (combining judging, umpiring and race management), then learn-to-sail/race, and finally learn-to-cruise (sail/power). The CYA Strategic Plan is relatively new, so the tables in this section present CYA data for officials, coaches and instructors for only 2010 to provide a baseline against which future progress can be measured.

The first table summarizes the number of officials, nationally. Care should be taken with numbers for Club Judges which may be inflated, since the Race Officer Program requires that National or Senior National Race Officers hold some judge certification level. These 'Race Officer Judges' may not be active in judging beyond the bare minimum necessary to maintain their certification.

There are very few certified umpires in the table, reflecting the low level of activity in match racing in Canada. There are indications of increasing interest in this area.

The summary table for race officials does not show provincial distribution, which is problematic: three provinces have no National or Senior National Race Officers, and six have no Regional or National Judges. Given the time required to develop officials, an ongoing strategy will be required to address this deficiency. A first step may be to convert more seminar attendees into officials; for example, only two of the seven candidates who passed judge examinations in Nova Scotia submitted applications to the judging program.

Finally, all three groups of officials include ISAF-certified members: judges, umpires or race officers. While at first glance the numbers appear satisfactory, many of the incumbents are aging, so there is a need to encourage new IJ, IU and IRO applications. Input from the Judges and Race Management Subcommittees suggest that more supportive CYA processes may be required if Canada is to improve its representation within the ISAF Officials community.

Looking at the LTS/R table, there may seem to be a large number of coaches, but few Learn-to-Sail Directors would describe the available pool as adequate. The CYA's strategic goal of growth in this area is absolutely sound. There is also a requirement for Learning Facilitators and Evaluators to support professional development and retention of our coaches and growth in the number of coaches. The TCC is currently developing means of recertifying past evaluators to provide near-term growth in numbers of evaluators to support coaching recertification by the PSAs.

The LTS/R and LTC(S/P) tables also highlight a discrepancy between *certified* and *registered* coaches and instructors. Certified instructors are fully qualified, but unless registered do not have delegated authority to certify students. Furthermore, registration brings liability coverage for coaches and instructors through the CYA, so use of unregistered coaches or instructors may increase course providers' exposure to liability.

The character of the Learn-to-Cruise community is rather different from either Learn-to-Sail/Race or Race Officials, being generally business-based rather than non-profit or volunteer-based. As such, *numbers* of instructors could be regulated more by business volume than by CYA policy. The TCC believes that business volume and numbers of instructors could grow with better promotion of CYA's differentiator as a supplier of on-the-water training.
